Sounds like many a Unitarian Universalist.

"You bring an aster, I'll bring a rose" -- here's an invitation to bring a flower to celebrate our annual tradition of the Flower Ceremony! Kevin will answer as many questions as time and his abilities allow, and he won't hesitate to seek help in answering. Very likely, the questions will be as interesting and revealing as any answers.

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From the Minister

Rev. Kevin Tarsa UUCM Minister

Pluralism, our theme for May, is not a word that rises often in everyday conversation. Well, that is not unless your religious institution is proposing to name pluralism as a central and demanding value:

Pluralism. We celebrate that we are all sacred beings diverse in culture, experience, and theology. We covenant to learn from one another in our free and responsible search for truth and meaning.

We embrace our differences and commonalities with Love, curiosity, and respect.

For me, pluralism is one of the most important and powerful values for our time, this in-between, inter-tidal, transition zone for humanity. It is an aspirational value that our tradition over time realized it would need to embody, first for its own sake,

because of the differences among its very own people. It is a value we've since sought to extend into our communities, nations and world, requiring us to swim upstream against both our personal impulses to prioritize familiarity and sameness, and our national and cultural fears, currently being so actively stoked, which look to rigid boundaries and a severe division of us/them for some sense of security.

If we could live into one core value deeply, especially as it is expressed above, I suggest that pluralism ought to be it. So many of the other values follow.

The outer edges of every religious tradition get this. Sufi teacher Hazrat Inayat Khan once explained that to speak of a Sufi mystic or a Christian mystic or a Jewish mystic is to miss the truth entirely. Once one reaches the transcendent place of mysticism, all such distinctions fall away, he taught. One is simply a mystic. Most of us navigate the world somewhere between fearful xenophobia and Khan's expansive conception of boundaryless mysticism, and oh, the opportunities for personal and spiritual growth are everywhere these days. The invitations to "embrace our differences and commonalities with love, curiosity, and respect" arise daily, and not least, among ourselves.

> Our close-in UU and friend and family circles are where we practice, honing our skills and our capacity for the larger outward-facing work. Work that asks us what we are going to do to address suffering in Gaza as well as antisemitism, how we're going to support trans youth and persons of color while embracing our radically rigid neighbor, how we are going to survive, maybe even thrive together, while not being of like mind, or perspective, or body, or neuro-chemistry, or life experience.

Opportunities to Explore Our Corps Values

It Matters: Dive into and Weigh our Corps Values

Members of our Unitarian Universalist Association, including three delegates from UUCM and Rev. Kevin, will vote on whether or not to adapt and adopt a new shared expression of UU values, a revision of the "Seven Principles." We invite and ask you to engage this conversation about UU Values in one of the ways below that works well for you, in the process making connections and informing our UUCM delegates as they prepare to vote on your behalf.

Here are a range of options. Your signing up in advance will help us plan for numbers and to know that we have critical mass for a given gathering:

Saturday, May 4, 9:30 AM to Noon -Walk/Reflect/Talk Hike

Join in a Walk/Reflect/Talk Hike with Rev. We'll read the various values aloud a couple at a time, and then reflect on those particular values as we walk in woodland-graced silence or walk and talk with partners (your choice). Periodically, we'll gather and pause to share what's come up for us before we read the next values and continue on, gradually returning to our start and drawing the threads together. Bring a chair and your post-hike lunch, if you wish, for community time at the end. Carpooling encouraged.

Board of Trustees

Last fall the Board formed a small committee to conduct several "Open Questions" sessions in order to gain insight into what the congregants of UUCM are thinking and feeling about UUCM, its place in their lives, and its place in the wider community. The Open Questions conversations took place in person, on Zoom and during meetings of various groups. All congregants had an opportunity to take part in the sessions. The Board uses the Open Questions process to inform our strategic planning and goal development. This process is always interesting and provides insights into our community. I am sharing a summary of the responses to the Open Questions here. I hope you find it interesting and helpful.

Each group warmed up with the question "What does Beloved Community mean to you?" and then addressed three questions on which copious notes were taken:

- Who do we want to be for one another?
- Who do we want to be for the wider community?
- What are next steps that could help us get there?

Some broad themes emerged across the groups, including:

- A need for belonging and connection, particularly as provided through small group opportunities
- The importance of being truly welcoming (many more details on this below)
- The value of trust, respect, authenticity, and personal growth
- The power of centering love in all we do
- The desire to be visible and known in the community, including as an entity dedicated to the greater good that shows up and acts in support of marginalized communities
- The need to offer both spiritual sanctuary and opportunities to engage in justice work and the importance of communicating that the two are not mutually exclusive but, in fact, support one another (and the importance of communicating that people do not have to engage in everything offered at UUCM)
- A desire to continue to work on multiculturalism including working toward being comfortable with discomfort and summoning curiosity as our first response

- A need to figure out and acknowledge differing viewpoints and to welcome minority views questioning how we "have always done things"
- A desire to support young people
- A desire to support the LGBTQ+ community
- A need to explore alternative worship-type opportunities to those on Sunday mornings in order to meet needs of people we are not currently serving (and alternative needs of those we are currently serving)
- A need to cultivate engagement at all levels, to grow volunteerism, and to steward our human resources (both staff and volunteer)
- A need to take a hard look at our culture of conflictavoidance which gets in the way of open and honest conversation and growth (which seems to grow out of a misguided desire to be kind).
- I would like to thank the Open Questions Committee for the many hours spent planning the work, conducting the sessions, and compiling this report. The Open Question Committee members are Kathryn Young, René Wiley, Corrie Silva, Lindsay Dunckel, Taylor Carey, and me:-).

I've heard it said about UUCM that "every service is different." While it's true that as a team we strive to keep things interesting, creative, and non-formulaic, we hope it's apparent that there are goals and intentions that guide us as we craft services, as well as consistent elements and a monthly theme. Worship Team members have different personal styles and talents, and we try to utilize these in support of any particular service.

Our themes from September through June are drawn from the Soul Matters material, which offer rich resources for worship planning as well as for small groups and religious education. In July and August we select a different theme pretty much each year.

In general we strive to include, each month, a service with a focus on individual growth, one that addresses our UUCM community, and one devoted to justice issues. It's somewhat puzzling to us when we hear comments about "too much" or "not enough" spirituality, as well as "too much" or "not enough" justice focus. What we hope to convey through all the services is that there is not a separation between the two, that each supports the other, and that everything is interconnected. Spirituality can lead directly to social action, and justice work can be viewed as a spiritual practice.

The strength of Unitarian Universalism is its ability to form a cohesive group from people of widely varying beliefs who value independent thinking and thoughtful questioning. We know we can't please everyone! Actually, "pleasing" is not our goal. If we make you think, feel, connect with others, and grow as a person we have done our job.

We'd love to hear anything you have to say about services at UUCM. Better yet, we'd love to have you work with us to create services that are deep, meaningful, and connective. Feel free to speak with any team member or Rev. Kevin if there's anything you'd like us to know or if you'd like to be part of our dynamic and fun team.


FY2024-2025 budget development is underway, and it will be presented to the community at the annual business meeting on June 2.

Here are some highlights of the campaign:

- A group of seven people came together to form the ad hoc Stewarding Guidance Group and lead the campaign with full support of the Board, Ministry, and Worship.
- Twenty-six of you from among the congregation stepped up to be Visiting Stewards, who were able to make oneon-one visits with everyone who wanted a visit.
- We came together for a community dinner for the first time in four years.
- Total pledges increased by 9% over the current year's pledges.
- Ten new families made pledges.
- Almost half of our families were able to make significant increases in their pledge.

The many activities at UUCM are thriving, energy is positive, and new people come through our doors each week – there is so much to appreciate as we approach the coming year!

For now, this is farewell from this Stewarding Guidance Group, but we will meet again this summer to review our efforts and set a course for next year's group and campaign.



Sermon School by Jenny Dewey

I call it "sermon school." The real name is from a book called "The Shared Pulpit: A Sermon Seminar for Lay People." The book is a guide through the stages of learning to write a sermon.

Reverend Kevin Tarsa gave us a copy of The Shared Pulpit. I received the book with an immediate shudder of resistance. I thought of third grade and how I dislike books that resemble workbooks. After flipping through the pages, I realized third grade was long gone. This would be an entirely different experience. I read the book and liked it. None of the pages asked questions about two trains going certain speeds and how long did it take for one to pass the other in the station. (I never got that right.) The book provides information on how to build a sermon in seven sessions every two weeks.

I never realized sermons are built. The architecture of a sermon follows the same precepts as those required to design and create a building. If the design of a building works well, the building will not fall down. A sermon begins with an idea embedded in a story. The idea is explored, elaborated on, and expanded. The idea originating in the story is revisited at the end. A well-designed sermon captures the congregation's imagination and is not forgotten.

This is a simplistic generalization. Unitarian Universalist beliefs do not carry the burden of absolute truths, nor promises of salvation, nor prayers to be memorized. Spirituality may be the province of individual members, and yet it can be shared by all members of the church. There is inherent value in sharing the pulpit with a member of the congregation. The words worshiping together take on new meaning.

My writing a sermon worthy of our UUCM congregation is not likely. Delivering one poses another dilemma. Shyness, a soft voice, and poor enunciation make it certain I will never share the pulpit. Knowing this does not diminish my enthusiasm. I'm discovering new ways to write. The words of others in sermon school inform me.

I am opened to new thoughts and feelings. I give myself the gift of listening.

Standing behind the pulpit with a magnificent sermon destined to go down in Unitarian Universalist history is not in my future. Opening my mind to new ways to design and build a good story is satisfying enough.

New Developments for our Justice Team

Second, the Justice Team members will now monitor the websites of at least 25 local non-profit organizations as well as UU affiliated organizations to identify any public events, fundraisers, workshops, etc. that would be of interest to our members. The team will advise the UUCM Administrator who will regularly update our calendar with information about these justice events taking place in Nevada County and the UU world. Anyone can click on the calendar item to get more detailed information about the who, what, and where of each event.

The Justice Team hopes that providing this timely information about justice events in our community will encourage greater participation in justice-making by members of our congregation.

Nisenan News

An update on the activities of the Nisenan Project Team Task Force

Many of you have undoubtedly been seeing the amazing push to support CHIRP (the non-profit arm of the Nevada City Rancheria Nisenan) and the Nisenan, in their hope to purchase 232 acres of John Woolman School property, which encompasses the site of a Nisenan village, Yulic'a. The Phase 1 funding goal of \$1.5 million was met before the first deadline of April 4, which is so exciting, and there's been huge community support. Yay! There have been, so far, 3,100 individual donations.

This is so wonderful – **and** ... there's still much more to be done. Woolman and CHIRP have been working hard together to make this happen, only to find the situation more complicated than anyone expected, requiring more time and more money to accomplish. Among other things, issues with infrastructure and permitting will have to be resolved before the sale can be completed. The need for more money, beyond the purchase price, was always expected - Phase 2 is intended to raise an additional \$.9 million - but the more we can raise beyond that, the better.

If you've experienced building a house, with unexpected construction costs, surprise! - or even just buying a home, which can bring its own surprises - you might not be surprised by this. This is like that, but in spades.

I have been looking at how much, how deeply, I value this hope - that, if it succeeds, not only will the Nisenan have land returned to them, but also the land will have its people returned to it. For me, in my worldview, this means so much. That I can get to live in a little corner of this continent where the land is coming awake to the return of its people, its partners; coming awake, coming alive, in a way that I feel it hasn't been for these nearly two centuries. That's worth a lot to me. The trees on that land will breathe the news to the trees around my house...

Meanwhile, our <u>"Facts and Fictions" presentation</u>, given by Frank Lawrence, has made a real difference, I believe. There were about 40 people present onsite for the event, and another 65 or so attending online, with Woolmanaffiliated folks mixed in in both groups. The recording was quickly posted on UUCM's website, and also on <u>CHIRP's</u> It has gotten 82 views on UUCM's YouTube channel, and another 194 on CHIRP's, and I have personally seen evidence of its effectiveness in helping resolve people's concerns about the sale.




Introducing New Children's Books with Pluralism Themes at UUCM

One of the amazing things about children's literature in the 21st century is its breadth and depth—a breadth of themes addressed in the dizzying array of titles coupled with deep exploration of those themes in individual books. The intellectual and emotional richness in children's literature today supports us in our efforts to highlight Unitarian-Universalist principles and values in our discussions with the children who attend Kids Connection on Sunday mornings.

Typically, we read and discuss a book after we complete our UU-inspired rituals of building our altar, lighting the chalice, and sharing our joys and sorrows. The books we read are the Kids Connection version of a Sunday sermon. Because the books we choose to share with the children play such a pivotal role in how we communicate with them about our UU worldview, we feel a responsibility to have engaging, correct, and up-to-date texts to help convey our intended messages. Many of the themes that we address with these readings and discussions are ones that have evolved over time, employing different linguistic conventions and emphasizing different ways of framing the relevant issues. We want to make certain that we are sharing with the children texts that are consistent with current ways of thinking and talking about these issues.





One very significant issue that we have addressed with our children recently is captured by the Soul Matters theme for May—namely Pluralism. Fortunately, this theme of pluralism is widely and honestly and creatively addressed in contemporary children's literature. To assist us in having rich and instructive discussions about the complexities of pluralism, we (the Family Ministry Team) decided to purchase some new books for our children's library, ones that openly and deftly address issues such as diversity, race, discrimination, and privilege in ways that are consistent with UU philosophy and that would be meaningful and engaging for the children we typically see on Sunday mornings.

Some of the new titles are "Don't Touch My Hair!," "How We Can Live—Principles of Black Lives Matter," "I Am Enough," and "Bodies Are Cool." We are looking forward to sharing them with the children and seeing what sort of discussions arise from them.

Finally, on some future Sunday, you might see one or more of our children leaving Kids Connection with an I VOTED TODAY sticker on their clothing, or even their foreheads. Occasionally, we present the children with two books, typically of similar content, and we ask them to vote for which book they want us to read to them. In this way, we work a small introduction to democratic process into our time together. If you see a young one, walking around with an I VOTED TODAY sticker, now you will know what their vote was for. You might ask them which book they voted for.
