**Justice** 

I write just as the annual General Assembly (GA) of the Unitarian Universalist Association ends for this year. As you likely know by now, the changes to Article II –

the new articulation of six deep UU values centered in love – were adopted by votes of the delegates – 80.2% voting in favor, 19.8% voting not to adopt the changes. So, we UUs will get to keep exploring what those values mean and what they ask of us.

(The only amendment adopted altered the phrasing of the Equity value without altering its substance.)

The majority of UUCM members who participated in this congregation's own pre-GA vote also supported the adoption of the Article II changes, but as with UUs writ large, there were strong feelings among some against doing so. Objections expressed at GA ranged from objections to wording choices, to the perceived absence of beloved language or ideas from the long-standing expression of Seven UU Principles, to concern about singling out anti-Black racism, to feelings that the process had not been inclusive enough.

Feelings were also very strong, both pro and 'concerned,' around the proposed Action of Immediate Witness expressing solidarity with Palestinians, a resolution calling for the return of all Israeli hostages, and a resolution "Affirming Transgender, Nonbinary, Intersex and Gender Diverse People as a Fundamental Expression of UU Religious Values," all ultimately adopted or affirmed by sizeable majorities.

I was taken with how many people expressed their stances regarding each of these in terms of feeling an "existential threat," or in terms of wondering, with deep sadness, whether there is a place for them here in Unitarian Universalism after all. In parallel with and surely drawing upon our anxieties about the nation and world at large, many people evidenced an all-or-nothing fear, experiencing all the stakes as terribly high, and each decision and action of ultimate consequence and importance.

Session IV held some of the most challenging conversations,

and early in that session, the wise Rev. Victoria Safford helped prepare us for any of the possible voting outcomes by offering a larger perspective, inviting us to keep asking ourselves what truly matters, and what doesn't (I recommend it to you. Rev. Safford's reflection begins exactly 31 minutes in.) I found her reference to the very early days of the now long-standing and beloved Seven Principles especially grounding. "Then, as now," she explained, "people tore their hair, rent their garments, at

GA lined up at microphones to decry the death of our tradition, the top-down imposition of a creeping creedalism that would destroy our movement. And here we are," she added,

> "not yet destroyed. We can neither be brought down nor saved by any bylaw change. It's the way we move [together] that matters."

Oh, yes. Who knows what kinds of decisions we will be called to make together, what changes and realities we will need to move through, what courageous stances we will be inspired to express, and how many times we will feel an existential threat or wonder whether there is a place for us in our communities. It is the ways we move together that will be most important and make the most lasting difference.

I welcome the now-adopted changes in our expression of our UU values and inspirations, and, knowing that not everyone feels the same – about this and any number of things – I'll be investing my energies and attention in how we move together. Come what may, that's what will matter.

Nostradamus has nothing to worry about from me. I thought I had written my final President's column years ago. Seems not. Like many of you at the recent congregational business meeting, I was moved by the reports given by Rev. Kevin and Acting President Pam Kisor. I was particularly moved by the plea and invitation to join in the effort to advance our spiritual community into an increasingly challenging future.

My last term as Board President ended shortly before the horrors of COVID. At that time, we were moving forward with the implementation of a new governance model that promised to open doors for more participation and opportunities for greater creativity arising from the ground up. Sadly, events far beyond anyone's control ground those aspirations to dust in a matter of weeks. Suddenly, instead of embracing a robust future, we were faced with the challenges of simply surviving. Rev. Kevin, the Board, along with the teams and committees stepped up and virtually overnight reinvented a path through the pandemic minefield, emerging into an alien landscape.

Our congregational meeting revealed the degree to which COVID still dominates our lives. Much of the energy and optimism that had driven us forward has necessarily been redirected away from the tasks that we had embraced with such enthusiasm towards the reality of survival as individuals and as members of a spiritual community.

We have survived, yet scars linger from the time lost to the virus. Since COVID, I have had two complete shoulder replacements. Friends have also faced new body parts and the manifestations of time and use on old ones. Although the desire to serve and to participate in congregational life remains, the nature of that service may reflect an inevitable shift in capacity.

But this is not a tale of woe. Unitarian Universalists are notoriously forward-thinking. Our little ship has been battered but we have weathered the storm, repaired our sails, and are charting our future course as we speak. New members have joined and are eager to get involved. I understand the reluctance of new members to throw themselves into full participation in congregational life until they feel more settled in, but don't let that stop you. Now is a wonderful time to enter upon what may well be the most enjoyable and satisfying phase of your lives.

I listened to Rev. Kevin and Pam describing what lies ahead and their pleas for members to get involved with something akin to guilt. Among the laundry list of needs they described: the Board needed a new President. Gail Schulz's plans to pick up the scepter were sidetracked by the need to repair one of those body parts I mentioned earlier. Pam, although willing to serve in an acting capacity for a short period, had earned the right and was more than willing to step away for a much-deserved respite.

I wasn't particularly busy, and I know the job. I know that it's not easy, especially because I know that I enter upon it this time pre-eclipsed by Pam's awesome service. So, here I am, writing my first President's column as a newly minted retread. The coming year should be interesting, elucidating, and fun. Please join Rev. Kevin, the Board of Trustees, the committees and teams to open our spiritual home and our loving message to the greater community. Throw yourselves into things with all the abandon your Enneagram encourages.



## Right Brain, Left Brain

### A Profile of Laura Harter by Jenny Dewey

Walk through the doors of the UUCM building on a Sunday morning. Two or three greeters will meet you. They wear yellow ribbons to distinguish themselves from others socializing in the foyer. You are met with smiles and encouraged to feel welcome, to feel comfortable. One of these smiling people is Laura Harter. In fact, Laura coordinates the scheduling of the greeters to make sure there are smiling

welcomers on duty any given

Sunday.

This describes just one of Laura's several volunteer activities. She is also Chair of the Membership Team and has just finished working on the Safety Task Force and the Stewarding Guidance Group. She also holds a once-amonth pot-luck lunch where everyone is welcome. Laura's organizational skills are certainly evident.

Less evident is the artistic side of her nature. Laura was once committed to following her drive to paint and explore graphic design but decided that it led to more of a "starving artist" lifestyle than was good for her. I can attest that she attends the drawing sessions at UUCM and draws beautifully. I know she paints as well. She is an example of a person with a strong executive side merged with an artist's sensibility.

This is an unusual blend of skills. The organizational brain is understood to be factual, and reality-based. The artistic brain is understood to be driven by emotion and perhaps a tendency to ignore reality in favor of artistic expression.

Laura describes herself as seeking ways to be a "wholistic" person. "Balance is important to me," she says. "I like the big picture and I like details." Writing is especially significant to Laura at this time. Participating in the writing sessions at UUCM gives her a "sense of community and connection."

(It is not by chance the writing sessions are named: Writing Connection.)

Laura uses her writing to find her voice and document something of her family's history, through stored letters, journals, photographs, and genealogy sleuthing her parents and grandparents stored in boxes. She wishes to write a family history based on this material. She describes it as a "daunting task," one she started to help her sister, who stores the family memorabilia. Both Laura and her sister want to understand

> their roots, honor their parents and grandparents, and provide something insightful for the next generation.

She visits her sister regularly in San Diego to go through the material and sort out real and imagined family dynamics - in written form. Her words create images of laughing, loving, generous family gatherings. The words also describe some of the inevitable dysfunction and grief. She navigates preserving family history and expressing personal feelings and points of view so she can tell a meaningful story. Laura hopes to create a useful and interesting family portrait for her children, nieces, and nephews.

It is easy enough to describe a starving artist slaving away trying to make real unreal dreams. Harder to describe the same person as someone who thrives in a world where

organization is a number one priority. If you ask Laura how she reconciles this she says her family culture was very focused on analyzing and solving problems. As the youngest of five she escaped what seemed to be long, tedious discussions by observing the natural world and beauty. As a teenager, "Art museums were my church and painting and photography were a spiritual practice before I knew what spiritual practice was. She says "Somehow I landed on my feet with my head in the clouds."

Pick Laura Harter as your "go-to person" and you'll have all vour bases covered.

### Postcard Campaign Update

#### **UUCM Rocks!**

We've sent postcards to 9,500 voters experiencing voter suppression in just four months and I'm not surprised. So many have helped - writers, funders, organizers, moral supporters, cheer leaders. We are an amazing team.

#### FLORIDA IS NEXT

We are part of the Reclaim Our Vote team writing to 969,000 Black WOMEN in Florida! Every woman in Florida should have a say in reproductive rights! Packets will be available June 30.

This is the first of our Get-Out-The-Vote campaigns for the November general election. Reclaim Our Vote is starting early because they have a goal to reach 18-million voters of color before November. UUCM is an important part of achieving that goal.

That means the Florida postcards will be WRITE AND HOLD. You can write them anytime but please HOLD THEM UNTIL OCTOBER 1 for mailing. Postcard Club members will write a minimum of 20 postcards a month, some many, many more. Single packet writers are encouraged to write as many as you are willing and able. So, write away and stash your completed postcards in a safe place. We will send out reminders in late September about the mailing dates.

#### STAMP PRICE INCREASE

The prices for postcard stamps are going up yet again on July 14, so I am going to stock up before then. Joining the Postcard Club allows me to know how many to buy at the current price. In Phase 1 of the Club (March – July) club members committed to at least one packet per month. So far we have bought 10,000 stamps at a cost of \$5,300 paid for by writers and donors. Now I need to know how many to buy for Phase 2 (August – October).

#### Sign Up Now for Postcard Club Phase 2

Postcarding for the November election will make a critical difference in the outcomes of crucial races. Current Club members and others willing to do at least one packet of 20 postcards – please go to <a href="https://www.uugrassvalley.org/gotv-postcards/">https://www.uugrassvalley.org/gotv-postcards/</a> now so I will know how many stamps to buy.

#### DISINFORMATION

In case you're hearing NOISE about voting trends among Black Voters, please take a look at this **Pew Research article**. Reclaim Our Vote has received a couple of questions about this topic. But the strategy for getting Black voters to the polls is not only still totally sound but it is more critical than ever given the REAL voting patterns for Black voters and the importance of this presidential election. The constant spew coming from diabolical news outlets is just another way to get people to stay home. It's affecting funding for our work. Stay focused on those whom you trust and the people on the ground. Remember that we are reaching people who are rarely contacted at all or included in the polling numbers that you read. Developing a habit of voting within this population can change election outcomes in our target states and nationwide. Thank you for the tremendous work you have done and all the efforts you will be applying to the 2024 election cycle. You are heroes!





**Bewilderment** by Richard Powers Presenter: Jo Waters






September 8, 2024:

Presenter: Claire Leve


In Atlas of the Heart, we explore eightyseven of the emotions and experiences that define what it means to be human and walk through a new framework for cultivating meaningful connection.



October 13, 2024: **Search** by Michelle Huneven Presenter: Susan Merrill

A sharp and funny novel of a congregational search committee, told as a fictionalized memoir by Dana Potowski. Dana is a restaurant critic and food writer and a longtime member of a progressive Unitarian Universalist congregation in Southern California. Under pressure

to find her next book idea, she's asked to join the church search committee for a new minister and agrees, resolving to secretly pen a memoir, with recipes, about the experience. The memoir, Search, follows the travails of the committee and their candidates —and becomes its own media sensation.



November 10, 2024:

**The History of Us**: Nisenan Tribe of the Nevada City Rancheria by Tribal Chair Richard B. Johnson Presenter: Cynthia Burton

The History of Us is about what daily life was like for the local Nisenan for thousands of years until about 1850. It relies on past Research by scholars and interviews with living tribal members. Did

you know nursing mothers chewed poison oak so their babies would have immunity?

Part two describes the changes after 1850 when gold was discovered and "this was the beginning of the great downfall of our Nisenan culture." Both parts, one happy and one tragic, can help us understand our neighbors, the Nisenan, who still live among us.




December 8, 2024:

I Cheerfully Refuse by Leif Enger,

This book is based on the myth of Orpheus, the musician who traveled to the underworld to rescue his wife, but it's set in an all-too-possible future. I chose to read this book because I love the author's way with words. Had I known it was "dystopian" I might have had second

thoughts, so I am glad I didn't know. But it is so much more than that! Beautiful writing, yes, and also engaging characters, a bit of an adventure story, a poignant description of living with grief and a complete refusal to give in to despair. It strikes me as a rather UU book in its determination to see the world as it is while centering on love, connection, and hope, with the belief they will ultimately prevail.



January 12, 2025:

The Postcard, by Anne Berest Presenter: Keith Johnson

Who wrote the Postcard? That is the mystery embedded in this poignant, multigenerational story of the Holocaust and its survivors.




February 9, 2025: Greta and The Great War by Adan Ehrlich Sach

# Reflection on the Lasting Effects of UU Religious Effects

Recently, one of my four stepsons visited me. Over dinner he shared with me some of his vivid memories of growing up with his Unitarian father, my late husband. His father spent many years designing and teaching the Unitarian Sunday school classes attended by his four sons during the mid to late 1960s. This conversation with my stepson caused me to reflect on what the long-term outcomes of UU religious education experiences might be. Consequently, I have identified at least three distinct responses that might emerge from children's regular participation in UU religious education programs. Before I describe these three distinct responses, I want to go on record as saying all three seem to be perfectly appropriate, desirable, and consistent with our UU values.

The first response is the one represented by my four stepsons.

They are all in their sixties now. Today, none of them identifies as Unitarian, and they never did after their time in their father's Unitarian Sunday school classes. (They were still operating under the Unitarian umbrella at the time of their religious education experiences.) Yet if you were to know them as I have known them for the last 44 years, you would recognize that

they could not be any more Unitarian in terms of their values and the ways they choose to show up in the world. If the goal of a religious education program is to send people out into the world with the sensibilities and inclinations to make a difference, a Unitarian-inspired difference, then mission accomplished with these four boys, now aging men.

The second response is one represented by my 33-year-old daughter, a child raised by the

same Unitarian father of my aforementioned stepsons. He did not, however, teach her Sunday school classes at the UU fellowships and churches we attended. I did. Unlike my stepsons whose memories of their Unitarian father's Sunday school lessons are still vivid, neither my daughter, nor I, can recall the specific content of the lessons I taught in our UU Sunday school classes over the years. We recall some of the children in those classes, but not the specific UU content of those lessons. Interestingly, even though my daughter was on the receiving end of apparently uninspired religious education experiences at the hands of her mother, today she proudly identifies as UU. How did this happen? I credit the

decade in her life, ages 10 to 20, when we took her to the UU family camp in the Mendocino woodlands for a week each July. There she met and bonded with UUs of all ages from all over Northern California. For my daughter, her reasons for identifying as UU today are primarily grounded in how great it felt for her to be around people like the UUs she met at camp. Today, her explicit knowledge of UU philosophy and values is relatively superficial, and she does not associate with any UU community on a regular basis. However, I count my daughter's UU origin story as a success. She is different from her brothers, and her pull toward UU was bound to be less intellectual and more social, and I would venture to add more spiritual.

Finally, there is a third response to one's early exposure to UU people, philosophy, and values. This response is as beautiful as it is rare. People who follow this pattern of response appear to connect deeply with UU at some point in their early intellectual, social, and spiritual development. Typically, they grow up, moving out into the world to get experience, and perhaps to extend their education, but eventually they make their way back to UU, sometimes even to their UU community of origin. We have an example of this response among us here at UUCM, our very own Sophia McKean. I think we can all agree that we secretly hope that at least some of our UU children will grow up to follow a path that is in some ways similar to Sophia's.

As you are all aware, UU has at its core a value for the individual's unique spiritual and intellectual path. Because of this core value, we celebrate the varying responses that our children have to their earliest UU experiences. Each child's, teenager's, and young adult's responses to their formative relationships with UU will be unique, distinctive, and valuable.

And that is as it should be.
