# **From the Minister**

Rev. Kevin Tarsa UUCM Minister

### Living Love Through the Practice of Presence.

My dear post-election people, if ever there were an invitation to practice being truly present, here it is. It is an invitation that arrives now in general as well as in numerous specific moments

throughout each day.

We know from experience that the incoming administration in Washington will throw up daily distractions, actions to shock and rile and keep people chasing, endlessly chasing, the latest urgency, the most recent not-to-be-believed threat or outright harm, the day's outrage. We can count on it, and, in fact, it's already begun. And thus, so has the need, already, to pay attention to staying grounded and whole and present as best we are able, so that we can face each day with as much wholeness, skill, and resilience as we can.

Despite my own introverted, contemplative propensities, I encourage you and us to approach this not as a set of parallel solitary journeys or a goal to be reached in isolation, at least not solely in isolation. For the inevitable demands of the coming months and years, whether we rush out to meet them or wait for them to arrive at our door, we are going to need others to help us stay connected to ourselves, to each other, and to the larger reality that holds all of us. This is part of what religion and religious community is here for.

This month, as we begin to move into recognizing and acting upon what is possible, we will be inviting and practicing together being present. We'll be looking for and lifting up tools and opportunities to practice grounding ourselves. Moving into the new year, we'll be exploring spiritual practices together so that you and all those new folks seeking community here will have chances to discover what helps you to remain anchored in who you are and in the values that define your integrity.

I know, this is not exactly a "Happy Holidays!" message.

The risk every December is that the holiday and holy day season will be experienced primarily as shallow and commercial, even crass. For me, this year, the approaching holidays, rooted in this season of longest nights

before the days begin to lengthen in the new year, take on more meaning than usual. I'm looking for depth within them, anchor points, more substantial sustenance.

For those of us on the progressive end of the religious spectrum, those of us who can usually take or leave these holy days, this is a potential gift stirring within our angst and disappointment - that we will need what and how we celebrate this season to matter. We will need these days to guide us toward our own ability to be truly present present to what is, present to who we fully are, present to each other and others, and present to the deep sense that we are part of a much larger rhythm and reality.

In the midst of this twisting journey, with all its distractions, may we together find the kinds of presence that matter.

# **Board of Trustees**

These columns are getting harder to write. While one wants to maintain a calm and even magnanimous acceptance of the results of the November 5 election, that would be a lie. I'm not calm, I have no equanimity whatsoever around the horrors the electorate has visited upon us. I am disgusted, I am angry, and I am completely beyond understanding the forces and attitudes that placed a sexual predator, rapist, and convicted criminal at the head of the most powerful government on earth.

Please don't misunderstand. I absolutely do not see this in partisan terms - preserving our 501(c)(3) status. What we have just witnessed cannot be explained as mere politics. This is a cultural, organic, and perhaps, even viral shift. Liberals appeared to lose their way. In rising to the defense of everyone, they appeared to reject or ignore the implications of the bell curve, the curve of natural distribution: stuff happens whether you like it or not. Conservatives, tired of always feeling "less than" for their choices simply dropped the hammer on logic, goodness, and truth to make a point ... badly.

As a person with a significant disability, I have always registered outside the norm of distributive characteristics. There is nothing I can do about it. Some things really are as they are. I've experienced the pain of being excluded from public education because of my disability. It is one of the great ironies of my life that while I was denied access to the public schools of Los Angeles County, I was welcomed in the reactionary wilds of Idaho and Alabama.

Go figure.

Stay with me: these unrelated elements are relevant. While because of direct, personal experience regarding Southern racism I detest the State of Alabama with most of my heart, I remain aware that in many ways, it treated me with kinder regard to my special needs than my beloved home state of California.

This is the point I want us to cling to as we sway untethered in the post electoral apocalypse of 2024. Trump voters are not necessarily the scourge of the earth as we may wish to consign them

Okay, I hear you asking, what does this have to do with the Board of Trustees right here at UUCM? Well, partly this: like Reverend Kevin, who has spent a great deal of time coming to grips with the horrors of the moment, the Board is eager to

learn from the members what is on their minds regarding the present and the future. We earnestly hope that on December 8, after the service, and again on December 10, via zoom, that you will share your views with us. Please feel free to ask us whatever you want to about what's on your mind, but more than anything, we want to hear what is going on for you.

I have shared my perception that the results of this election are both more and less than they appear. But that's just my personal appraisal. More importantly, what is yours? What does the election mean to you and yours?

One of the distinguishing characteristics of Unitarian Universalism is that its adherents demonstrate among the highest levels of intellectual achievement of all religious affiliations. I get it, some of us are not Einstein, but our denomination over the centuries has included some of history's most profound intellectuals.

I am one of those who believe that intellectual greatness did not end with the Age of Enlightenment. Even today, amidst X, Facebook, and Instagram, the intellectualism of our predecessors resides as robustly and energetically as ever. Sure, Google, TikTok, and whatever else proliferate in the era of post-scrivener communication, dominate the modes of communication, but the dissemination of ideas, those things that capture the imagination and compel exploration, remains the same. On November 5, 2024, the electorate thought, "What happens if I connect this wire to that one?"

We're finding out.

## An Exciting New Art Exhibit!

ARTIST'S RECEPTION: DECEMBER 15, AFTER SERVICE

For the next three months, the Art and Aesthetics Team is privileged to host an exhibition of the work of our own Lin Jovanovic in the UUCM library. Lin is a mosaic artist. She takes broken pieces of pottery or tile and uses them to create something new, something even more beautiful. That process was the theme for the month of November, so it seems especially appropriate to be showing her work at this time.



Lin's artwork will be on display by the second Sunday of December; her official reception will be December 15. Please have a sneak peek if you just can't wait, and then join us at the reception to celebrate her talent and creativity and to ask all your burning questions.

### HERE, IN HER OWN WORDS, IS LIN'S STORY:

I took my first mosaic class over 25 years ago and I was hooked! What a blast to break up tiles with a hammer and challenge my brain to construct a design with those broken pieces and the spaces in between.

Career and family limited the time I could put into my art, but moving up to Grass Valley and finding a house that had a ready-made studio and a storage area (affectionately called "The Hoard") removed many limitations and

opened me to explore and deepen my skills and passion for this art form.

I work with almost any material that takes my fancy – some commonplace in this work like tile, stained glass, smalti (small bits of mosaic glass), and dishes - some more fanciful like figurines, nuts, metal bits, fused bobbles, stones, or shells.

In looking at my work to prepare for this exhibit, I noticed my drive to master many techniques and mediums in mosaic art. Two-Dimension is one expected choice, but I love 3-D and sculptural expressions, the magic of the light of glass-on-glass mosaics, the whimsy of pique assiette\* (crockery), the way a color freedom mosaic bends the mind, and the wonder of micro mosaics to fascinate. For me these are all ways to play and to bring an experience to the viewer that is visceral and sparks curiosity. I appreciate you taking a look.

\* From goldbugmosaics.com:

"Pique assiette or trencadis is a style of mosaic that



incorporates ceramic shards, broken dishes and other found objects into a design. While traditional mosaics used small cubes that were uniformly shaped, pique assiette or trencadis tends to use non-uniform pieces. The term pique assiette has a French origin and various sources say it means 'stolen plate' or 'broken plate.' It also refers to someone who is a scrounger, which of course fits because most pique assiette art is created with recycled or scrounged' materials."

# Listening to a Labyrinth

### Please note:

Jenny Dewey is taking a short break from her monthly feature writing to focus her time and energy on some health issues. She is delighted to have UUCM member Gene Gilligan, one of her Writing Session participants, submit the following essay:

Several years ago, I was with a girlfriend visiting the Biblical Gardens in Grass Valley. We walked and observed the many spiritual displays.

As we were leaving, we came upon this strange maze, with a path lined with stones weaving around inside a large circle. I had never seen one before. I now know this maze was a labyrinth. She suggested I try it. I started slowly walking on the path in the labyrinth. Following the path to the center and then continuing on to the exit. I was almost breathless when I finished and had to sit and think about what I had just realized.

The labyrinth is one continuous path with many long and short lengths with sharp turns. You cannot leave the labyrinth until you've walked the length of the path. A maze is similar, but you have choices as to which path to take and how you can exit. What took my breath away, when I finished walking the labyrinth, was I had always looked at my life's path like walking in a maze: making decisions as to which way I wanted to go or which direction I wanted to travel to reach my goals. The labyrinth is one continuous journey with adjustments along the way.

I have walked several labyrinths since that first one at the Biblical Gardens, but none have made me feel the way I did that first time. I did have a unique experience walking a labyrinth this month in Nevada City. This labyrinth's path was made of small pea gravel which slightly moved as I walked. There were also very slight ups and downs. I felt unsure because my ankle was a little sore from the slow short strides I had to take to keep my balance.

When I was finished, I walked around the outside of the labyrinth, and I felt much better, more confident.

That Sunday at UUCM,
I realized it was the
anniversary of my daughter's
arrest on October 20, 2018.
Maybe the date had been
weighing on me and I didn't
realize it. Maybe she was
walking the labyrinth with
me. Her life's path allowed her
to graduate from two colleges,
then took her to a short career in
occupational therapy, jail, and prison.

While in prison she mentored inmates trying to pass their GED; she was transferred to a rehab facility because of her good behavior. She continues to mentor inmates and is allowed to have a part time job. She is applying as a receptionist at a medical facility and is an online student and fulltime tutor at Sacramento State. No, this is not the path she chose, but like the labyrinth's path, she keeps moving forward, meeting the turns. Working to do what she loves in situations she does not love. Being open to following the path and trying to create the best for her.

# Nisenan Task Force Update:

### HOMELAND RETURN

Escrow closed! After mighty efforts by the tribe, Frank Lawrence (tribal attorney), and others in clearing all the paperwork and legal hurdles, and enthusiastic fundraising efforts from the community, including Friends Meetings and alumni of John Woolman School, the JWS property has been transferred into the hands and the stewardship of the NCR Nisenan and CHIRP.

Tribal families are beginning to move into residences on Yulic'a, and members of the tribe are beginning to connect with the land and contemplate what it needs for its healing and thriving.

### INDIGENOUS PEOPLES' DAY SERVICE

In the October 13 service, Shelly Covert and Jordan Reznick spoke with Frank Lawrence about what makes for a good relationship between academics and Indigenous people. Creating trustworthy relationships is about sharing with tribes the results of academics' research, rather than approaching research as an "extractive" process that provides little or no benefit to the people whose lives and cultures are studied. Jordan gave us a small preview of the presentation he gave later that day at UUCM, about research into the Indigenous history of the Malakoff Diggins area through photographic records, and Shelly provided her perspective on it, gained through her own family history. It was a lively and fascinating discussion, and it can be viewed in the Sunday service recording for October 13.

JORDAN REZNICK ON PHOTOGRAPH VS. GRINDING STONE

Following the service and a soup lunch (thank you Shannon Dooley-Miller and all soup-bringers!), Jordan showed slides and spoke about the place of photography (which is only ten years older than the Gold Rush!) in California, leading to Yosemite being designated a National Park, excluding the Indigenous people of the area from the photographs and from the park, while showing the effects of genocide in the changing landscape in the post-Gold-Rush years.


