March: Living Love through the Practice of Trust

March 2 Life Flows On: Trusting Yourself to the Water Rev. Kevin Tarsa, with the UUCM Choir, and Carol Nimick, Worship Associate

We begin this trust-themed month by exploring the origins of our personal sense of trust, and by inviting that personal sense of trust into conversation with the concept of faith. Allan Watts claimed that "To have faith is to trust yourself to the water. When you swim you don't grab hold of the water, because if you do you will sink and drown. Instead you relax, and float." Easier said than done for most of us. However, we are not alone.

The current frantic attempts to dismantle democracy are challenging many people's sense of trust and hope in the future. Surprisingly, for some it's not a lack of hope that is the issue, it's the fear of holding hope, hope that might be dashed or disappointed, a fate that seems more painful than not holding hope in the first place. What's a Unitarian Universalist to do?

March 16 Trust the People: Love-centered Promises and Possibilities Rev. Kevin Tarsa and all, with Carol Nimick, Worship Associate

Why be, and be part of, a religious, values-centered community these days? And how? Steeped in vital questions about various

freedoms and who makes decisions, our religious ancestors came up with their own answers through a series of cottage meetings begun in 1637. In the process, they planted and watered the seeds of democracy for this nation. They did so by placing their concept of love at the center. What are we to do now with the legacy we've inherited?

March 23 Spring Inflection: Faith in Nature Lindsay Dunckel & Elizabeth Rose, Worship Assoc.

We gather just after the Spring equinox, as the light begins to overturn the looming darkness. Trusting in this season of renewal, we'll explore through ritual, words, and song what in us is called to emerge.

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From the Minister

Living love through the practice of trust...

Now there's an invitation for this moment, when our trust and our faith in so many human realities are challenged day by day. It's in these moments that we turn to our sources of reassurance, our anchors for our courage, our trusted distillers of truth, our reservoirs of hope. (Well, those and sugar. Or binged TV shows. Or myriad distractions and self-soothing practices.)

Seriously, when our faith and trust is shaken, we are likely to turn toward familiar groundings, to return to what has helped us before, or to what we believe might anchor us adequately now. It can be a revealing experience, shedding light on how our heart, our psyche, and our spirit operate, on how we've grown, and on the deep, long-ago associations still rooted in us.

To be sure, it is important for us to regulate our emotional responses first, to calm our understandable anxiousness and fear enough to be able to see more clearly the truth of what is and of what we can do. As we're able to do so, we might, in the process, catch a deeper glimpse of what and who we truly trust when all else fails, of where we place our deepest faith. The encouragement is to complete the sentences rather quickly, before "shoulds and oughts" and the urge to have the "right" answers get a chance to creep in. I recommend it to you.

> For many of us who find our way to UU communities, the depth of the current national and world challenges to our deepest values and trust in humanity reaches the level of a crisis of faith. It is a painful and yet potentially fruitful crack in our expectations and assumptions, a crack those among us who hold marginalized identities may have been facing and living within for a long time. The crack affords us a crisis of faith that can reveal our current anchors and whether or not they feel true enough, substantial enough, meaningful enough for when we really need them, like now. I recommend asking yourself these 25 variations on "what you turn to when..." to surface both personal insight and your personal spiritual/emotional resources.

This month, in Sunday services, we'll explore our sense of trust through the lenses of Faith (looking for the origins of our personal sense of trust), Hope (looking for the ways we can trust beyond the frightening present), and Love (trust in and within relationship and community), we'll root ourselves in our Faith in Nature, and we'll honor the tender, frayed edges of trust that knit so much of life together, including our

At the Mid-Year meeting, the discussion around our relationship with the Nisenan Tribe was particularly lively. Some expressed concerns that the Task Force not being renewed would mean the loss of our relationship with them. That was not the intention. The discussion then addressed how allowing the Task Force to lapse signals a maturing relationship with the Tribe. Task Forces are entities of limited scope, purpose, and duration. That model does not fit our relationship with the Nisenan. We will continue to ally ourselves with the Tribe and its concerns in ways that best suit the needs of the moment.

and brighter, but no matter how hard we try the sanctuary resists expansion. Despite our modest acreage, I find myself encouraging everyone I meet who betrays even the slightest curiosity about UUCM to attend and see for themselves. Turning away or discouraging people from attending because of our tight quarters ranks nowhere among our principles and values.

I also want to take a moment to revisit our Mid-Year meeting. It turned out to be livelier and more interesting than I had anticipated. The actively expressed interest and participation of the members present seemed a bit sharper and more attuned than expected. I mean this in the most positive and appreciative way. I was prepared for a bylaws amendment that was free of controversy only to be brought up short. That is among the many reasons I love our congregation. Folks want to know what folks want to know and they are blessedly Okay, I can't close without an observation about the Trump administration's hostility to human values. A recent news article suggested that the Center for Disease Control (CDC) would no longer publish its flu vaccination schedule and recommendations. Whether the article was correct or not, it seems readily apparent that the incoming leadership of the federal public health system has shaken our confidence in the agencies that have guarded our health, and further intends to pursue theatrics, disruption, and chaos before settling down to matters of actual public health concern. Therefore, it is imperative that everyone pay attention and stay informed about the presence of seasonal communicable diseases and their prevention without depending on the federal government for help. So far, it appears that the California Department of Public Health will not shirk its responsibilities, but it is best to be on our toes just the same.

Update on Sprucing Up UUCM

We are all enjoying our lighter, brighter church home. Since we started this work in December, the foyer, hallways, Alcott Room and former Nursery have been painted, and new lighting placed in the foyer. This could only happen thanks to the great work from our volunteers and our one paid worker.

What's next? The Facilities Exploration Committee (FEC), Arts and Aesthetic Team and Ministry Council have been considering carpeting and new vinyl flooring. The vinyl will go in the Alcott room, the former nursery room, and the kitchen. New carpet tiles will go on the ramps, the hallways, office, and Channing room. That will be a big step, and the most costly item. At that time, we will have to make any repairs needed to the concrete sub flooring in those two rooms at the back of the building.

Meanwhile, we are only putting limited artwork back on the walls, while the Ministry Council and the FEC work to develop criteria for what goes up on the walls, and in what way: Do we have more bulletin boards or use shadow boxes? Do we limit what goes up, and who decides? We all want to reduce clutter and keep our building attractive and welcoming.

I hope you all had a chance to see Lin Jovanovic's beautiful mosaic work while it was displayed in the library. We have so many talented, creative members of our congregation, and it is such a privilege to be able to share their work with our members.

Speaking of talented, creative members, our newest exhibition features the paintings of Phil Horning. Phil's work will grace the walls of our library for the months of March, April and May. While the date for his official reception is still to be determined, you are welcome to take a sneak peek.

Here is more about Phil in his own words:

MEET PHIL HORNING

I grew up back east in Pleasantville, New York, a suburb of New York City. My mom taught nursery school and did oil paintings as a hobby. As a kid I liked to draw and did a few paintings. In high school I worked for a neighbor down the street and built a dry wall and installed landscaping. The interest in art and landscaping led me to pursue Landscape Architecture as a profession.

After graduating from Syracuse I joined the Peace Corps in Iran and worked there for four years designing and building city parks in Gonbade Kavoos and then worked for the Iranian National Park Service in Tehran. During this period, I did drawings when there was time and continued this when I traveled for nine months through most of Asia.

Upon my return to the United States, I worked for the U.S. Forest Service on four different forests in California and took a special assignment to Tasmania, Australia, to set up a visual management system for the Tasmanian Forestry Commission. Throughout my career I have had the opportunity to hike and ski in a wide range of mountainous and forested areas and these experiences have been an inspiration to me.

> Now that I am retired, I paint scenes that I hope capture some of the experiences that I find inspiring. Some of those experiences include my time as a Peace Corps Volunteer. In those cases, I take pictures of my 50-year-old slides projected on a wall and then store them digitally. Sometimes it is the special lighting as the sun sets, sometimes it is the composition of ridges and mountain peaks that attracts me. One of my favorite activities is downhill and cross-country skiing so you will see several snow scenes.

Typically, my photos of snow capture the bright white during the middle of the day, so I change the shade and lighting in the paintings to create more interest. In other cases, it is the vivid colors of fall, or the dramatic motion associated with a large waterfall that I capture. It seems to me that Mother Nature provides endless opportunities, both dramatic and subtle, to observe amazing colors, shapes, textures, and compositions, and I just try to paint a few of these examples to share with others. UUCM Endorses 24-hour Economic Blackout: Friday, February 28 FROM 12:00 AM to 11:59 PM

- Do not shop online or in stores
- No Amazon, no Walmart, no Best Buy...Nowhere!

DO NOT SPEND MONEY ON:

- Fast food
- Gas
- Major retailers

DO NOT USE CREDIT OR DEBIT CARDS

for non-essential spending

WHAT YOU CAN DO:

- Only buy essentials that are absolutely necessary (food, medicine, emergency supplies)
- If you MUST spend, ONLY support small, local businesses.

SPREAD THE MESSAGE – Talk about it, post about it, and document your actions that day!

WHY THIS MATTERS!

- Corporations and banks only care about their bottom line.
- If we disrupt the economy for just ONE day, it sends a powerful message.
- If they don't listen (they won't), we make the next blackout longer. (We will.)



Get out the Vote Postcard Update

The critically important Wisconsin Supreme Court postcard campaign is

almost done. It must be important if Elon Musk is pouring in millions to support one of the candidates!

There are still a few packets of 20 postcards waiting to be picked up. You can find them on the postcard table in the UUCM foyer. **We mail finished postcards March 1-11.** For those who don't know, early voting starts on March 18. These Reclaim Our Vote campaigns are designed to combat voter suppression. The Center for Common Ground is the lead organization. In Wisconsin they are partnering with Souls to the Polls, an impressive faith-based organization that provides rides to the polls and other important support to Black voters.

NEXT UP: VIRGINIA

Campaigns in support of the Virginia State elections will begin in mid-March and write through April. Early voting begins on May 2; the election is June 17.

By now we have learned that state legislators are the ones who set the rules for voting in the state, including setting maps of an electoral constituency. Fair maps give each party a chance. Gerrymandered maps make it close to certain that one party has no chance to win. Those maps are used in congressional and presidential elections as well as state elections.

Virginia holds its statewide elections in years with no federal election. In 2025 the election will include races for Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General and ALL members of the House of Delegates.



The Practice of Trust

Our Kids' Connection program has an intentional design, one that is consistent with our goal of promoting feelings of **TRUST** in our young charges. One overarching design principle that

permeates our program is best captured in the phrase **CHOICE WITHIN STRUCTURE.** Competing philosophies of education often are geared toward one or the other of those two constructs—choice or structure. In contrast, we believe that choice and structure are symbiotically significant in the ways that they help children develop trust in themselves, as well as in the people and practices that constitute our Kids' Connection program.

Let's start with STRUCTURE. Structure gives our program a recognizable and predictable form. When children can predict how each Sunday morning will unfold, they learn to trust the program and the people who run it. When new children join us, they are understandably unsure of

themselves. They do not yet trust that this experience will be a positive one. But after they have visited with us a few times, we see them quickly getting involved by collaboratively building our altar, sharing a joy or sorrow, creating a pretend meal in our kids' kitchen, or making a piece of art at our table full of art supplies. Routines and rituals, by their very nature, are repeating, allowing children to understand on their own what is expected of them and how to fit in.

This ability to figure out on their own how to operate within the inherent structure promotes in our children a trust in their own abilities. Even when the routines and rituals are not ones a child particularly enjoys, the fact that they are predictable helps them cope with the challenge of getting through the activity successfully. Many, many decades ago, when I was teaching high school English, a particularly challenging student said to me with a defiant tone, "I really hate these vocabulary assignments you give us." Then, a brief moment later, his defiance shifted to a tone of acceptance when he said, "but they only come on Wednesdays, and I can live with that." He trusted me, my instructional program, and himself because he knew the routines surrounding those undesirable vocab assignments. Imagine how much more threatening those assignments would have been if he had not known when they were likely to pop up.



Now for **CHOICE**, what is its contribution to fostering children's trust in themselves, us, and our program? Structure is a foundational element in our program. Without it, or with an insufficient amount of it, the children's experiences in the program would be some version of chaotic. Chaos does not promote trust. But by itself, structure can also be limiting. We want our children to build on the trust that structure promotes by taking ownership of their experiences in Kids' Connection, pursuing their own interests, expressing their own thoughts, creating their own pieces of art or scenarios for play. When children make choices about how to operate within a thoughtfully provided structure, they learn to trust their own agency.

One ritual activity in our Kids' Connection program that provides many opportunities for the children to make meaningful choices within a wellarticulated structure happens immediately when we enter our Sanctuary upstairs. The first experience of the day is building our altar. This activity is well structured; it must be the first activity of the day for the following activities to have a space to play out. There are a few basic rules to follow in that certain ritual pieces are always displayed on the altar, although where exactly they are placed is open for the children to decide. Beyond those few ritual pieces that always go on the altar, however, the options for decorating the altar are wide ranging. Our altars are like

snowflakes—no two are ever alike! Watching the children decorate the altar with their specific choices is like gaining a little window into their minds and hearts. Some of them are fascinated by the light of the candles and battery operated, mini-chalice flames. Some of them want the surface of the altar to be covered with stars and stones and beads and shells. Some of them like to place on the altar larger, more sculptural items from nature like pinecones and feathers. Some are fascinated by and want to play with the water we pour into the vessel for our joys and sorrows stones.

Our children make their own choices for the altar, place those choices carefully and strategically on the altar, and then step back to appreciate how their contributions helped to create this important part of our UU ritual. This adds to their sense of trust. They trust that they are important to us and that their ideas and creations are important to us. We trust them to be our co-creators of the Kids' Connection program. This is a bidirectional form of trust that is meaningful and genuine, for children and adults alike. Examples of how **CHOICE WITHIN STRUCTURE** permeate our Kids' Connection program are too numerous to begin to catalogue for you here. Suffice it to say that structure and choice are two defining features of our Kids' Connection program and taken together they are greater than the sum of their parts. You can **TRUST** me on that!!
